Indelible Portraits: Polish Hybrid Nonfiction

June 2-4, 2017

Polish documentary came into its own in the late 1950s and early '60s, when the first political thaw after Stalin's death made it possible to speak openly about social and political ills. A "black series" of documentaries spoke out about dire conditions in postwar Poland. But by the 1970s and '80s, filmmakers realized that social commentary was not enough. They craved a new approach to form. The resulting films were bold and inventive. They were also metaphorical and clever, to outwit the censors. In this program, guest curator Ela Bittencourt gathers key works made in this tradition of Polish hybrid documentaries, including work by Bogdan Dziworski, Marcel, ŁozińskiZofia Kowalewska, Michał Szczęśniak, Marcin Koszałka and Michał Marczak. See It Big! Spielberg Summer

June 3-July 16, 2017

Steven Spielberg is the ultimate "See It Big" director. The idea that a movie should be larger than life, visceral and kinetic in its impact, and able to transport an audience defines Spielberg's approach to filmmaking, whether he is making us experience wonderment or fear, and whether he is making a sheerly entertaining thriller or an absorbing historical drama. Spielberg has now been making films for more than 45 years, and has been Hollywood's dominant creative force ever since his blockbuster hit Jaws devoured the summer of 1975. The seventeen films in this series include **Duel**, Jaws, Jurassic Park, E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial, Poltergeist, A.I. Artificial Intelligence, Minority Report, The Color Purple, Empire of the Sun, Always, 1941, Raiders of the Lost Ark, Schindler's List, Saving Private Ryan, Lincoln, Bridge of Spies, and Munich. On the occasion of this series, the Museum of the Moving Image and Reverse Shot will publish their second book: Steven Spielberg: Nostalgia and the Light. More info

Film Movement: A 15th Anniversary Celebration

June 8-July 2, 2017

Film Movement is a New York-based distributor of outstanding independent and international films that has released more than 250 feature films and shorts. With an innovative distribution strategy including theatrical runs and a film-of-the-month club, and a library including new films from the international festival circuit and classics by

established directors, Film Movement plays a vital cultural role in introducing the best in global cinema to American audiences. This retrospective includes a selection of fifteen feature films and a number of shorts, to celebrate the vitality and vision of the company. The series opens on Thursday, June 8, with *In Between*, an energetic and distinctly modern dramedy by the Palestinian director Maysaloun Hamoud, who will receive the Young Talents award at Cannes this year from Isabelle Huppert. In Between's producer Shlomi Elkabetz (Gett: The Trial of Viviane Amsalem) will introduce the screening in person and the film is scheduled to open theatrically at the end of the year. The series continues with Takeshi Kitano's second feature **Boiling** Point, Naji Abu Nowar's Academy Award®-nominated "Bedouin Western" Theeb; Pedro González-Rubio's narrative documentary hybrid *Alamar*, Eric Rohmer's '80s classic *Full Moon in Paris*; Alice Rohrwacher's gritty exploration of Italian Catholicism, Corpo Celeste, Papirosen, Gastón Solnicki's intimate portrait of multiple generations of his own family in Argentina; Wolf Gremm's *Kamikaze '89*, featuring the legendary director Rainer Werner Fassbinder in his final acting role; *Human Capital*. Paolo Virzi's adaptation of Stephen Amidon's acclaimed novel; Mexican director Fernando Eimbcke's dreamy, mesmerizing *Lake Tahoe*; *Toni Erdmann* director Maren Ade's debut feature, *The Forest for the Trees*; Argentine director Lucia Puenzo's *XXY*, a delicate tale of sexuality and identity; Marleen Gorris's Academy Award Foreign Language Film winner **Antonia's Line**; Shane Meadow's English coming-of-age tale **Somers Town**, and a closing film, to be announced. The King of Zing, from Queens: A Don Rickles Tribute SUNDAY, JUNE 11

A Queens kid, the late Don Rickles (1926–2017) was a comedy titan. Raised by Jewish parents in Jackson Heights—"my father was born in Russia and came here when he was three with a gun, a grenade, and a picture of Stalin in his pants" and "my mother was a very strong woman—a Jew Patton"—young Donald J. went to Newport High School in Elmhurst where he was president of both his class and the drama society, enlisted in the Navy during WWII and was stationed in the Philippines. After the war he enrolled at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts and studied alongside Jason Robards, Anne Bancroft, and Grace Kelly, and moved to comedy when a mentor told him to stop chewing up the scenery but "never lose that energy." In honor of the late comedian, the Museum presents a day-long tribute kicking off with John Landis's Mr. Warmth, The Don Rickles Project, featuring interviews with Martin Scorsese, Clint Eastwood, Chris Rock, Bob Newhart, Sarah Silverman, and many others and rare footage of Rickles doing stand-up and home movies. This will be followed by a screening of *Kelly's Heroes*. Organized by Gabriele Caroti, with Chief Curator David Schwartz and Associate Film Curator Eric Hynes. Museum of the Moving Image presents the exclusive New York theatrical engagement of *bwoy*, a suspenseful, deeply affecting, and sharply observed drama about erotic longing and emotional connection from John G. Young. *Bwoy* stars Anthony Rapp as a suburban man who becomes entangled in a chaotic, passionate online affair with Yenny, a young Jamaican man. "Control and emotional intensity are perfectly balanced in John G. Young's *bwoy*, a minimalist indie in which action is largely mediated by phones and screens," wrote Amy Taubin in *Film Comment*. "Young's measured direction and editing and Rapp's performance are extraordinary for showing how easily repression and guilt can create a dissociated fugue state where virtual and actual become indistinguishable." <u>More info</u>

The Pride of the Yankees

Lou Gehrig's speech at a packed Yankee Stadium on July 4, 1939 (two years before his death), when he said "I consider myself the luckiest man on the face of the earth" was one of the most emotional moments in sports history, and the Samuel Goldwyn film *The Pride of the Yankees* is one of the most enduring of sports movies. Published on the 75th anniversary of the film's release, *New York Times* sports writer Richard Sandomir's book *The Pride of the Yankees: Lou Gehrig, Gary Cooper, and the Making of a Classic* (2017, Hachette Books) uses scripts, letters, memos, and rare documents to tell a riveting behind-the-scenes story. The film will be followed by a conversation with Sandomir and Maria Cooper Janis, moderated by the writer James Andrew Miller, and by a book signing in the Museum store. More info

Jim Henson's *Time Piece*

ONGOING IN THE VIDEO SCREENING AMPHITHEATER

In 1965, Jim Henson made *Time Piece*, an experimental nine-minute short film that tells what he called "the story of Everyman, frustrated by the typical tasks of a typical day. The film was nominated for an Academy Award for Best Short Film. It remains fresh today as both a time capsule of 1960s experimental filmmaking, and as a brilliantly conceived and edited example of Henson's creativity.
